

TRAINING THE TRAINERS: REBOOT

GEECT Symposium Spring 2017
Lillehammer, Norway, May 8-10th

Twelve years after The Norwegian Film School's publication of *Training the Trainers*, most of us are still chasing and refining a learning approach in our film schools. Just as we become confident in an approach – somehow it doesn't work as well for the next cohort. We must rely on experience and our ability to transform feedback into adjustments in our learning approach and programmes. Teachers, often trained as filmmakers, not educators, can find themselves quite alone in this work – but we can help each other through sharing experiences between teachers from different schools, through exchanging best practices.

Recently the Nordic film schools joined efforts to create a training programme for film school teachers called “The Artist as (Film School) Teacher”. This course for filmmakers teaching in film schools combines digital tools for online learning with meeting points for building relationships and sharing experiences, giving participating teachers the opportunity to earn credits-points for formal pedagogic qualification to teach in higher education. Could this new approach be useful for other film schools?



The symposium “**Training the Trainers: Reboot**” will focus on the film school teacher, creating an environment for teachers at GEECT and invited schools to share experiences and gain some practical insight into the role and tools of the teacher. The core of the symposium is a series of workshops dedicated to giving participants greater insight into the questions of “becoming a film school teacher”. Participating teachers can exchange experiences and practices, and – in keeping with a focus on peer learning – take part in educating each other.

Another common theme throughout the symposium is: “How do we provoke students to make interesting, provocative, personal, and/or engaging films?” Filmmaking is craft, it is profession, and it is art; different schools emphasise different sides of this triangle but at its core, filmmaking is also storytelling. However, there is seldom much discussion about what we encourage student filmmakers to tell stories about. Should we focus on content at all? If so, how?

Finally, NFS will present its new initiative: The *Centre of Excellence in Film and Interactive Media Arts (CEFIMA)*.
