Minutes

European Film College, Ebeltoft, Denmark

4 and 7 September 1997

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1. Approval of Documents

The General Assembly approved the Minutes of the General Assembly 1995, Oaxaca, and following documents contained in the dossier for the Congress and General Assembly 1997:

- the reports of the Executive 1995-1997,
- the reports of the Project Chairs 1995-1997,
- the reports of the standing committees 1995-1997
- the financial documents 1995-1997

2. Amendments to Statutes and Rules

A majority of two-thirds is needed for amendments to the statutes (Statutes, art. 28 [3]).

Simple majority is needed for amendments to the rules (Rules, art. 42 [2]).

The General Assembly agreed to the proposals of the Executive as detailed in the Ebeltoft dossier:

- a) redefinition of "full member" category,
- b) clarification of "candidate member" category
- c) suppression of "associate member" category.
- d) redefinition of "corresponding member" category
- e) introduction of a new category of members: sustaining members
- f) admission of new members
- g) amendments to the definition and number of projects

2.1. Categories of membership — Admissions

Before the General Assembly '97 there were three categories of membership for CILECT schools: candidate, associate, full.

The General Assembly 97 has refocused the membership of CILECT schools on two categories only: candidate and full. The "associate" category has been eliminated in order to do away with several inadequacies. Associate members under the old statutes automatically become "full" members.

The notion of "**full** member" has been redefined. Full members are established film and/or television, or research institutions training institutions, recognised as institutions of higher education and train students to a professional level.

Statutes, Article 5

(1) The Association shall be composed fundamentally of film and/or television schools, having in their respective countries the status of institutions of higher education offering training to a professional level, and film and/or television research institutes officially recognised in their respective countries.

The new definition was approved. (In favour: 33; Against: 2; Abstention: 1; Blank votes: 1)

All existing "associate" members become "full members" upon voting of the new statutes and rules.

An amendment proposed by Elvino Sauro, Ryerson to broaden the membership to schools of audio-visual arts and sciences was not accepted (In favour 18; against 5; abstentions 12; blank votes: 2).

Candidate members can be of two different types.

- a) the Executive can admit as candidate members schools that do not yet meet the criteria for full membership,
- b) applicants for full membership are granted the status of candidate member by the Executive, pending approval of their application by the General Assembly.

The General Assembly approved the amendments clarifying the definition of "candidate member" and the admission of new members

Statutes, Art. 8

Candidate members are:

- a) institutions and emerging institutions which do not yet fulfil the conditions for obtaining full membership, but can benefit from being recognised by CILECT.
- b) applicants for full membership may be granted candidate membership by the Executive Council pending approval of their application by the General Assembly

Statutes. Article 13

- a) Full members are proposed by the Executive Council and are admitted by the General Assembly in open ballot by simple majority, with the exception of honorary members, when a majority of two-thirds is needed.
- b) Candidate, Corresponding and Sustaining members are accepted by the Executive Council representing the General Assembly.

2.2. Redefinition of "corresponding member"

The notion of corresponding member has been redefined in order to broaden the membership of CILECT in film and tv schools. The intention is to enable teachers in CILECT member schools to have a more direct association with the organisation, and also to include in CILECT teachers who share our goals but are not connected with CILECT member schools.

The new definition of "corresponding member" was approved. (In favour: 38; Against: 0; Abstention: 0; Blank votes: 2)

Statutes. Article 9

Corresponding members are teachers and other persons affiliated with CILECT member institutions who wish to participate in CILECT activities as individuals. Under special circumstances, persons who share CILECT's goals and who are not affiliated with CILECT schools may be granted Corresponding Membership at the discretion of the Executive Council.

2.3. New category "sustaining member"

"Sustaining members" are individuals, foundations, companies or organisations who share the interests and goals of CILECT, and who contribute on an annual basis to the development of the activities of CILECT.

The proposal to set up a new category of members "sustaining members" was approved (In favour: 39; Against: 0; Abstention: 0; Blank votes: 1).

Statutes, Article 10

Sustaining members are companies and other organisations that support the interests and goals of CILECT.

2.4. Projects

The General Assembly agreed that the number of Project Chairs on the Executive Council should be "up to four" instead of "four" under the pre-Ebeltoft statutes and redefined the notion of Projects. (In favour: 39; Against: 1)

Statutes, art. 20

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(7) In addition to the President and the Vice Presidents the General Assembly shall elect the Chairs of Project Committees as required by the General Assembly in its programme plan for the following biennium. The number of these Project Chairs will be up to four. They shall be elected for two years.

Rules, art. 35

(1) At each General Assembly members of the Association will discuss the range of programme activities which would most benefit the Association in the following biennium. They may be projects of general benefit to the entire organisation or regional or inter-regional initiatives representing priorities of importance to a significant minority of the membership or to the structure of CILECT.

The General Assembly agreed that relevant articles in the statutes and rules be streamlined to conform to the amendments.

3. Members

3.1. Status Upgrades

Following status upgrades were voted unanimously:

- Ngee Ann Polytechnic, Singapore From candidate member to full member
- University of Westminster, UK
 From associate member to full member¹

3.2. Deletions

a) Following schools were deleted from membership for non-payment of the fees.

b) Deletion was suspended for a period of 90 days for schools that are the only CILECT member in their country. The General Assembly agreed that if no payment has been received within this period, the deletion would come into force automatically.

¹ Status upgrade voted by the General Assembly before the new statutes were approved. Under the new statutes the existing associate members automatically become full members.

3.4. Honorary Member

Henning Camre proposed Raymond Ravar for honorary member.

Raymond Ravar was Secretary general of CILECT from 1970 to 1990 and is currently managing director of EAVE (Les Entrepreneurs de l'audiovisuel européen), a Brussels based MEDIA II project of the European Union.

Raymond Ravar was elected unanimously honorary member.

4. Projects

It was noted that no project proposal for development over the coming biennium had been received prior to the General Assembly.

The participants in the General Assembly met in small groups in order to devise a number of possible projects and then proposed them in the plenary. The proposals were discussed at great lengths.

The Executive then suggested devising projects along two major lines: a) training methodology and b) curriculum development.

After considerable discussions and some dissension it was agreed to develop projects within following general framework:

Project 1: Approach to new teaching areas / Distance Learning

Project 2: Story-Telling and Recruitment / Training of Teachers

Project 3: Triangle and Production for Children

Project 4: Non-Fiction and New Television

It would then be the responsibility of the elected project chairs to refine the contents of their area of responsibility.

5. Finances

5.1. Fees

Fees for "ex" associate members will be adapted gradually to the fee level for full members. Fees will be CHF 1,600 in 1998 and CHF 1,800 in 1999. In 2000 it will be the level of full member fees.

Candidate member. CHF 1,500

Corresponding member. CHF 250. Existing corresponding members are exempted of the payment of the fee.

Sustaining member: basis rate CHF 5,000

The fee structure was adopted unanimously.

5.2. Budget 1998 and 1999

The General Assembly approved unanimously the budget for the biennium 1998-1999 (see page 5).

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BUDGET 1998 and 1999

The budget is based on current membership fees. It includes projections showing the variation of possible distribution of income pending on the percentage of fees collected. The 120% column shows the possible distribution if fees were increased by 20%.

The expenditure budget is divided in two main blocks: fixed overhead costs and variable costs. The projections show that the money available for variable costs (including all projects) dramatically decreases as fees are not collected. Were the fees to be increased the fixed overhead costs would remain the same while the amount of money available for variable costs would increase considerably.

The distribution of variable costs is based on fixed percentages.

There were 40 voting members. Two-thirds majority required for 1st, 2nd and 3rd ballot was 27.

Candidate: Henning Camre (nominated by Maria Dora Mourão)

In favour: 34 Against: 2 Abstentions: 4

Henning Camre was elected Vice-President TDC for a term of four years.

Vice-President Development

Candidate: Wolfgang Längsfeld (nominated by Al Samfors)

In favour: 33 Against: 2 Abstentions: 5

Wolfgang Längsfeld was elected Vice-President Development for a term of four years.

Projects Chairs

The Executive nominated Rod Bishop, Mohan Agashe, Caterina D'Amico. Chap Freeman nominated Rolf Orthel.

There were 38 voting members. Two-thirds majority required for 1st, 2nd and 3rd ballot was 25.
